The community has set its goals, and the ways to measure them. Now it's time to check Tasmania's progress ...

The measures in the table over the page show that Tasmania has made progress in some areas – like reducing the number of avoidable deaths, increasing investment growth and stabilising our regional population.

The table also shows that there is work to be done if we are to have the kind of Tasmania we want. Areas for improvement include literacy and numeracy, cost of living for low-income families, workforce participation and greenhouse gas emissions.

The State we're in ...

The Tasmania *Together* Progress Board keeps track of the community's progress in achieving our State plan, Tasmania *Together*. The plan has 12 goals and 143 measures that express the community's priorities and cover all aspects of life.

The 12 key measures below show our progress across Tasmania *Together* using data available at 5 November 2007.

Compared to last year ...

	1. Costs of essentials for low-income families have increased substantially.
	2. Tasmanians feel safer at night both at home and in public places.
	3. Student literacy and numeracy for Years 3, 5 and 7 have remained unchanged.
	4. There has been a large reduction in the number of avoidable deaths.
	5. Our regional population remains stable.
	6. Attendance at cultural heritage sites including our museums and art galleries has increased.
	7. The number of visitor centres with Aboriginal cultural interpretation has not increased.
	8. The percentage of people voting in local government elections has decreased slightly.
	9. There has been a decrease in the percentage of people participating in the workforce.
	10. Tasmania has had strong investment growth.
	11. The amount of land protected in conservation reserves has increased.
	12. Tasmania's greenhouse gas emissions have not been reduced.
